Start with the End in Mind

Grade 12:

Students will submit their applications for admission and scholarships between August-January (most by November 1).

WHAT DO COLLEGES CONSIDER?

- 1. High school GPA (grades 9-12)
- 2. Strength of Curriculum (grades 9-12)
- 3. Admission Test Scores (grades 11-12)*
- 4. Extracurricular Activities/Work (grades 9-12)
- 5. Admission Essay (grade 12)
- 6. Counselor Recommendation (grade 12)
- 7. Demonstrated Interest in the School (grades 11-12)
- 8. Teacher Recommendations (usually grades 11-12)

HIGH SCHOOL GPA

- By far most important factor in the admissions/scholarship process.
- Cumulative gpa is considered.
- Colleges are typically only using gpa from grades 9-11 when making admissions decisions.
- Only semester grades (January and June) are factored into gpa. 6 week progress report grades are not factored in.

STRENGTH OF CURRICULUM

- When appropriate, students should enroll in challenging courses.
- Many of these classes have weighted grades.
- More challenging classes will help them prepare for college admissions tests and will also help them be better prepared for college level work.

The million dollar question...

"Is a "B" in an honors class better than an "A" in a regular class?"


ADMISSIONS TEST(S) SCORES

- There are two college admissions tests:
 - The ACT (offered 7x per year)
 - The SAT (offered 7x per year)
- When do students test? Junior Year (ideally)
- Many students will take a prep course to prepare for one or the other but the best way to prepare today is to take challenging courses, read, do your homework!

23	1130–1150	2.80
22	1100–1120	2.90
21	1060–1090	3.05
20	1030–1050	3.20

17	920-950	3.65

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

- Why is it important to be involved?
 - Get/feel connected
 - Gain exposure to careers, different people, etc.
 - Help others/community
- What kind of activities should my child be involved in?
 - In-School Activities
 - Clubs, Athletic Teams, Art, Drama, Music...
 - Outside Activities
 - Community Service/Volunteer Work
 - Paid Work
 - Summer Enrichment Programs

OTHER FACTORS

- 5. Admission Essay (grade 12)
- 6. Counselor Recommendation (grade 12)
- 7. Demonstrated Interest in the School (grades 11-12)
- 8. Teacher Recommendations (usually grades 11-12)

A YEAR BY YEAR TIMELINE

9TH GRADE

- Earn good grades
- Build relationships with teachers, counselors, club sponsors, etc...
- Get involved! Start building your resume
- Keep a folder or list of all of your activities and accomplishments
- Start thinking about college. Going on vacation? Take a look at colleges in the area.
- Start thinking about careers/possible majors. Talk to family, friends, job shadow, etc...

10TH GRADE

- Continue to take challenging courses, earn good grades, stay involved/build your resume!
- Take practice College Admissions Tests
 - Free online practice tests, test prep books

11TH GRADE

- Take the PSAT (October)
 - Practice for the SAT and for consideration for the National Merit Scholarship Competition
- Prepare for the ACT and/or SAT
 - WGHS daytime Test Prep class (free, offered during school day for elective credit)
 - Outside test prep
- Take College Admissions Test(s)
- Research Colleges and Build Your List
 - College Visits
 - Attend College Fairs
 - Meet with Admissions Representatives who visit WGHS

12TH GRADE

- Apply for admission and merit scholarships (August-January)
- Apply for need based financial aid (FAFSA) beginning October 1
- Receive decisions throughout the year—all by April 1
- May 1—National Commitment Day

THE A+ SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

- If a student:
 - Graduates with a 2.50 gpa
 - Completes 50 hours of mentoring or tutoring within the district (not community service)
 - Has a 95% attendance rate
 - Maintains a good citizenship record and stays drug free
 - Earn a score of "Proficient" or "Advanced" on Algebra EOC
- He or she can attend any community college in MO (for up to four years after graduation) for free
- Not planning to attend a community college?
 - Some four year colleges in MO offer scholarships for students who complete the program
